

"Starting in September 2022, a young female moose started making an appearance in Sterling. By October, she was frequenting a farm that had a single horse named Eugene. She was getting into his paddock to visit with him and eventually showed him how to get out. On two separate occasions, they met up and roamed around the neighborhood for a while. While we weren't concerned about the budding relationship, we were concerned about the two causing an accident or injury to themselves, or residents trying to catch a glimpse of the pair. We addressed the issue of the horse getting loose with the owner; the cause was identified as an opening in the fence that was then repaired. While returning to the horse home, it was suspected that the elderly owners, both in their mid-80's, were possibly struggling to maintain care of the horse at their age and without help. I had a difficult conversation with the owner about allowing me to find him a new home and he agreed that it was time. While it was sad to see the unlikely friends separated, we knew it was for the best and moved Eugene to an Equine Rescue Farm in New Hampshire where he now has lots of horse friends and plenty of folks to help care for him.
