March was a busy month for the ACOAM Board! We began the month by welcoming Class 37 to the Academy. The students come from across the Commonwealth with a variety of animal welfare and law enforcement backgrounds. We are excited to teach them about Animal Control and are equally excited to learn more about each student as we assist them on this journey.

ACOAM VP's hosted 4 roundtables in which 61 animal welfare professional met and exchanged ideas, problem solve, and resources in different regions of the state. We have found these roundtables to be very informative and a wonderful way to network with other agencies across the state.

March was also a month of training opportunities! Two of the three trainings were offered at no charge, and all of the trainings were eligible for CE credits class. On August 10, 2022 Westford Animal Control captured an injured Cob (male Swan) from Nabnaset Lake with fishing line wrapped around his wings and an "ankle." He had also swallowed some of the line and the hook was lodged in his mouth. The Swan was transported to Tufts. An initial assessment determined that the line was wrapped so tightly that every time he moved his body, it would pull on the line he had swallowed causing even more damage. Thirteen days later, Westford was able to release the Swan back to the Lake were he reunited with his mate.

## **MAMMAL TRAINING ON MARCH 21ST:**

ACOAM hosted Ainsley Smith of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), who presented a free training on Marine Mammal Stranding for Animal Control Officers, Natural Resource Officers, and Harbormasters.

Our Coastal Cities and Towns have the unique role and responsibilities for managing marine mammal calls for service and the complex set of circumstances they present. ACO's who are more inland also benefited from this training as Seals and exotic "pets" sometimes make their way into River channels. This often involves collaborations with multiple agencies, many of which were present in today's training.
